Warm Welcome venues continue to support residents

<u>Warm Welcome</u> venues remain open across Surrey to provide support to residents over the winter months. Residents can enjoy a safe, warm, friendly environment to have a hot drink, read a book, socialise with others, and receive energy-saving information and advice.

Since opening on 1 November 2024, over 11,000 Surrey residents have attended Warm Welcome venues. Over 1,700 fuel vouchers have been distributed and over 8,300 essential items given out. These include electric blankets and keep warm packs which contain items including hats, gloves and blankets. Over 3,800 residents have been given energy and debt advice from Surrey Community Action, Citizen's Advice and trained volunteers, with over 3,700 meals and food bank referrals provided.

An <u>interactive map</u> is available indicating where each of the 80 Warm Welcome venues are situated across Surrey.

Olive training platform outage affecting multiple services

Olive, the online training provider, is currently inaccessible to external users, including non-Surrey County Council staff. This affects several groups such as Surrey Children's Academy (SCSA) partners, foster carers and partners at the Surrey Safeguarding Children's Partnership, Twelve15 staff, library volunteers, and the Surrey Skills Academy partners.

The IT&D teams are working with the Olive supplier to resolve the issue, which is expected to be fixed by 17 February 2025.

A manual workaround is available for the mandatory 'Working Together to Safeguard Children' course. External users needing this training should contact the Academy via email. There are no workarounds for other courses.

New research collaboration aiming to reduce health inequalities launching in Surrey

Surrey County Council has received £5 million in funding over five years from the National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) to create a Health Determinants Research Collaboration (HDRC). The goal is to improve residents' health and reduce health inequalities by focusing on social factors that affect health. The funding will boost local research capacity

and support studies on prevention and public health where there is currently no evidence. It will also promote decision-making based on local knowledge and community involvement.

HDRC Surrey is a partnership between the council, the University of Surrey, and voluntary and community faith partners.

Planning for your future events for 2025

Age UK Surrey, in partnership with Surrey County Council, is holding a number of <u>Planning for your future</u> events across the county throughout January to March to help people plan ahead to live the life they want.

The campaign hopes to encourage people to have early discussions about their future care and support preferences, understand support options, the importance of financial planning, and help them to make the right decisions in times of crisis.

Feedback to date has been excellent with 98% people finding the events helpful, 90% felt more confident to start a conversation with someone they trust, 89% would recommend to someone else, 88% learned something new and 72% were prompted to start making plans.

Aimed at self-funders, carers and care arrangers we encourage professionals to signpost people to local events. More sessions are being planned for staff working across the health and care system.

Share for Better Care Week

<u>National Share for Better Care Week</u> starts on 24 February 2025. It shows how people can turn everyday moments, like waiting for the kettle to boil or the bus to arrive, into chances to make a positive impact. Supporting the campaign helps raise awareness about the importance of feedback and the difference it makes.

The Care Quality Commission (CQC) and Healthwatch England have organised a campaign to get more people to share their feedback to improve health and care services. The interim Chief Inspector of Healthcare and the Chief Executive of National Voices wrote an article about why sharing care experiences is important, especially for those facing health inequalities.

Notification of Surrey Downs GP Practice merger - Stoneleigh Surgery & Spring Street Surgery

Spring Street Surgery and Stoneleigh Surgery will merge on 14 February 2025. This will bring both teams together, improving and extending services for patients and staff.

The merged practice will be called Spring Street Surgery and will be located at Bourne Hall Health Centre. Stoneleigh Surgery will close on 14 February 2025, and services will move to the Spring Street Surgery site from 17 February 2025.

Oral Health improvement strategy published

Surrey County Council has published a <u>new oral health improvement strategy</u> for the county.

This 2025 to 2028 strategy, jointly developed and owned by Surrey County Council, Frimley Integrated Care Board and Surrey Heartlands Integrated Care Board, lays out an ambitious plan of action to make our oral health the best in the country and further reduce rates of tooth decay by:

- · reducing oral health inequalities in children and adults
- improving the oral health of our care home residents
- putting the mouth at the centre of our service

Home energy improvement guide launches

Residents in Surrey who are looking to upgrade their homes with energy saving retrofit measures can now access guidance from Surrey County Council's new <u>Home Energy Improvement Guide</u>.

The guide features detailed and practical advice on appropriate retrofit measures for three common house types in Surrey. These range from simple cost-effective upgrades like draught proofing, to full-scale retrofits including solar and heat pump systems.

Time to Talk Day – small gestures, big impact

These scammers ask for immediate payments and threaten to disconnect the landline if refused. They may know names and addresses to seem more convincing.

Energy Advice

Surrey Coalition now has a member of staff dedicated to helping save money on energy bills and can offer support via telephone or video call appointments to assist with:

- joining the Priority Services Register (PSR)
- signing up for a Home Energy Advice Taskforce (HEAT) Survey, or using the Surrey Energy Advice Tool (SEAT)
- help with energy grant application
- signing up for pension credit (this will give automatic eligibility for the Winter Fuel Allowance)
- referrals to boiler servicing for Reigate and Banstead residents only

Registration for the Household Support Fund

Surrey Coalition is distributing more funds from the government's <u>Household Support Fund</u> to help disabled people and those with long-term health conditions in Surrey.

Registration is now open for those who did not apply in 2024. If funding was received in 2024, applications can be submitted from 1 February 2025 and will be considered after new applicants. Applicants can only apply once and must meet the criteria.

There have been reports of scam text messages about the Household Support Fund and heating subsidy. Residents will not be directly contacted to apply for these funds.
